<u>Historical Nicknames & Diminutives in Genealogy – A Short List</u>

Names can, at times, be a bit of a problem when doing genealogical research. This is especially so if the researcher has to deal with the presence of hypocorism (using a shorter form of a person's given name; for example, when used in more intimate situations as a nickname or as a term of endearment).

It is natural to expect that a person will be known by their full given (i.e., "first") name, especially when it comes to "official documents" such as census pages, passenger lists, vital certificates, and so forth. But, this may not be the case. A person may have been known by a nickname or a diminutive name either through their own personal preference and usage, or through the common use of that diminutive in their family or within their own local community. Thus, an Elizabeth may have been known as a Beth (or a Liz, or a Liza or a Betsey or a Bess or a Libby or a Betty).

Searching for information about a person via a common diminutive or nickname of their given name (after having come to a 'dead end' when searching under their full given name) may well reveal genealogical riches untold.

This brief document lists <u>some</u> of the more commonly encountered diminutives of historic given names. In order to keep it within a reasonable length, a number of the better-known or more widely known diminutives, e.g. –

To complicate the whole naming situation even further, it should be noted that a number "nicknames" or "diminutives" such as 'Amy' (for Amanda or for Amelia), or 'Molly' (for Martha or for Margaret), also can be legitimate full given names in and of themselves.
